

Pippa's Summer School PREVENT – Anti-Radicalisation Policy

Overview

Pippa's Summer School recognises its duty, under section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015 and in line with The Prevent Duty April 2023, to have 'due regard to the need to prevent people being drawn into terrorism'.

The aim of the Prevent Duty is to reduce the threat to the UK from terrorism by stopping people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism

Pippa's Summer School accepts the Department for Education's definition of extremism as; 'vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Also included in this definition of extremism is calls for the death of members of our armed forces, whether in this country or overseas. Terrorist groups very often draw on extremist ideas developed by extremist organisations.

Pippa's Summer School staff understand the need to be able to identify children who may be vulnerable to radicalisation and know what to do when they are identified.

The Prevent Duty

In order for all those involved in student welfare to fulfil the Prevent Duty, The Designated Safeguarding Lead Jodie Godliman has undertaken Prevent Awareness training and the Prevent Lead at Pippa's Guardians, Imogen Trevethan has undertaken Prevent Awareness, Referral and Channel training and can provide advice and support to other members of staff on protecting young people from the risk of radicalisation.

Pippa's Summer School staff may also find taking this course useful as they too are in an important position to identify risks within a local context.

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There is no single way of identifying an individual who is likely to be susceptible to a terrorist ideology. Therefore, staff must use their professional judgement in identifying children who might be at risk of radicalisation and act proportionately.

Pippa's Summer School staff need to be alert to changes in students' behaviour which could indicate that they may be in need of help or protection. Young people at risk of radicalisation may display different signs or seek to hide their views. Pippa's Summer School staff will not be expected to unnecessarily intrude into their student's life but as with any other safeguarding risk, they must act when they observe any behaviour of concern.

If a member of Pippa's Summer School staff, host families or students do have a concern about a young person, they should follow the Pippa's Guardians normal safeguarding procedures, including discussing their concerns with their Designated Safeguarding Lead and/or the Prevent Lead, Imogen Trevethan or Deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead, Ben Hughes. Further steps can then be taken by the team to refer on to the appropriate authority

In Prevent priority areas of the UK, the local authority will have a Prevent lead who can also provide support if needed. The local police can also be contacted for advice by dialling 101 (non-emergency number).

The Department for Education (DfE) has a dedicated helpline of 0207 3407264 or counter.extremism@education.gov.uk to enable staff to raise concerns relating to extremism directly if preferred. The helpline is not intended for use in emergency situations, such as a young person being at immediate risk of harm or a security incident, in which case the normal emergency procedures such as dialling 999 should be followed.
